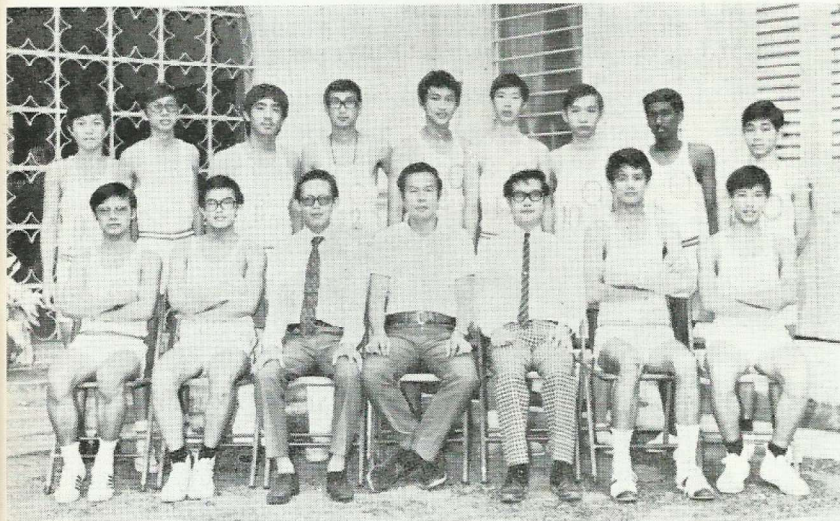

Primary School 1

STAFF AND ENROLMENT:

Primary School 1 has 28 classes in 1973 with a total enrolment of 1362 pupils at the beginning of the year. The pupils are under the charge of the Ag. Headmaster Encik Khoo Kok Hean, assisted by 33 qualified teachers and two clerks.

319 pupils were registered for the Std. 1 classes, but we were only able to admit 200. We apologise for those who have been sent away.

300 pupils from Std. VI classes will be leaving us to join the Secondary School.

DISCIPLINE:

The discipline of the school is maintained by a Board composed of Prefects appointed from the Upper Primary Classes which is under the charge of Encik Khong Shu Ming and Encik T.A. Dass. They are assisted by 6 teachers weekly. The Ag. Headmaster is the Chairman.

Certificates of Commendation are awarded to Prefects who have discharged their duties properly throughout the year.

SCHOOL ASSEMBLIES:

School Assemblies are held twice a week —

on Mondays and Fridays. These assemblies are to foster a spirit of pride and respect for the National Anthem and also unity among the pupils.

At these assemblies, the National Flag is broken, followed by the singing of the Negara-Ku and then a short talk on civics by the Headmaster. The assemblies are rounded off with the singing of the School Rally.

SCHOOL TEXTBOOKS COMMITTEE:

This Committee has been functioning for the past 10 years. Members of the Committee are appointed to review books on various subjects bearing in mind the contents in conjunction with the Government syllabus and their suitability for class use. Before any books are introduced, they have to be tried out for a year side by side with the identical book used.

IMPLEMENTATION OF BAHASA MALAYSIA IN ENGLISH MEDIUM SCHOOLS:

This year all subjects are taught in Bahasa Malaysia from Stds. 1 to 4, with English Language as a second Language. From Stds. 5 and 6, all subjects are taught in Bahasa Malaysia except for Mathematics and Science.

The change of medium in the teaching of the remaining subjects into Bahasa Malaysia will be phased gradually until 1975, when all subjects will be taught in Bahasa Malaysia.

Jawi is taught to pupils from Stds. 2 to 6 as from this year.

Six teachers attended a Bahasa Malaysia Course at Kota Baru organised by the Ministry of Education.

LANGUAGES:

The importance of Bahasa Malaysia and English is constantly stressed to the pupils and they are encouraged to express themselves in these media whenever possible.

An English Language campaign week was organised from 14th July to 20th July 1973 to encourage pupils to speak and write in the language. Prizes were offered to those pupils who did well in the school level competitions.

Classes in Chinese and Tamil are conducted from Stds. 3 to 6 for pupils whose parents wish them to take up these languages.

EXAMS AND WEEKLY TESTS:

Examinations are held twice a year, once in Mid-June and the other in October. During the course of the year, weekly tests are given to the pupils on various subjects. Results of these tests are recorded in the pupils' report cards once every two weeks for the parents' or guardians' signature. Parents / Guardians are requested to sign the children's report cards in their own language, if they are unable to do so in English.

We appeal to Parents/Guardians to take a keener interest in their children's conduct and progress and to comply with the request to sign their children's report cards.

201 pupils sat for the Std. V Government Assessment Examination on 10th & 11th Sept. 1973.

Muslim pupils receive instruction from their religious teacher – Encik Mohd. Ismail b. Hj. Ibrahim. They are encouraged to sit for the Koran Examination held by the Religious Affairs Department, Ipoh.

Catholic pupils are grouped together in their various standards and given religious instruction by Catholic Teachers. Other pupils are taught Moral Science or Civics during the Catechism lessons.

Rev. Bro. Philip Thompson prepares Catholic pupils for 1st Holy Communion and Cik Bernadette Chin prepares them for Confirmation.

We thank Rev. Fr. Ki, Rev. Fr. Wallace and Rev. Fr. Regis Anthony for looking after the spiritual needs of our Catholic pupils. We also wish to thank our Rev. Bro. Climacus John Toh for his voluntary Moral lessons to our pupils.

SPORTS ACTIVITIES:

(a) Our 15th Annual Athletic Sports was held in the morning of 15th March 1973. All the events on the programme were run off smoothly. We congratulate the Batu Gajah S.R.J.K. for winning the cup for the Inter School Relay and also Encik Hiong Kwang Hwa and his assistants Puan Anna Shanmugam and Puan K.E.J. Soosai Raj for winning the Champion shield for Pius House this year, and Encik Khong Shu Ming and Encik Jimmy Ng Hoong Onn for organising the sports successfully.

We thank Encik Lim Guan Choe, A.M.N; P.J.K; O.St.J. our former Headmaster who kindly consented to come and give away the

prizes to the successful participants and M/s Nestle's of Ipoh for supplying free 'Milo' drinks to the pupils.

Our Relay Team were runners-up in the Central Perak Combined Schools Meet held at the Perak Stadium this year. They also won the inter school relays held at the Ipoh A.C.S. Primary, the Cator Ave. S.R.J.K. the Sungai Pari Tamil School and the Sam Tet School Ipoh. Congratulations to the Athletics Master, Encik T. A. Dass, who have coached the team so well.

Rahim Raja won a gold medal in the 4 x 400 m. Relay for Perak at the Malaysian Schools Sports held at Kuala Trengganu held on 26th July 1973.

Paul Yuen won a gold medal in the 50m. breast stroke and a silver medal in the 100 m. breast stroke events for Malaysia at the Asian Games held at Bangkok on 14-15 July 1973.

(b) Teachers were appointed to train pupils for the following Games - Football, Badminton, Table-Tennis, Sepak Takraw and Hockey. All the teams did reasonably well in inter-school competitions organised by the Schools' Sports Council.

OTHER ACTIVITIES:

(a) *Cubbing and Valiant Vanguard*s: Pupils are encouraged to join these two organisations to foster a spirit of cooperation and friendliness among themselves, through competitions, games and various other activities.

(b) *Music*: Pupils who are interested in music are coached by Rev. Bro. Philip to play the accordion. These music lessons are held on Saturday mornings.

(c) *Shell Traffic Games*: A group of pupils were trained by Encik Hor Kum Fatt assisted by Encik Kok Pak Ching to take part in the Traffic Games competition which was organised by the Education Department, Perak in conjunction with the Shell Company, Ipoh. The team captured third place in the competition and was awarded a small trophy.

(d) *Hari Guru*: Hari Guru was celebrated in the school with the reading of the Pupils' pledge and the Teachers' pledge at an Assembly.

The Std. 5 pupils organised a fancy dress competition to entertain the teachers.

This Mini Terminal Magazine started in 1962, and now twelve years old is much appreciated by parents. It keeps them informed of all the terminal activities of the school.

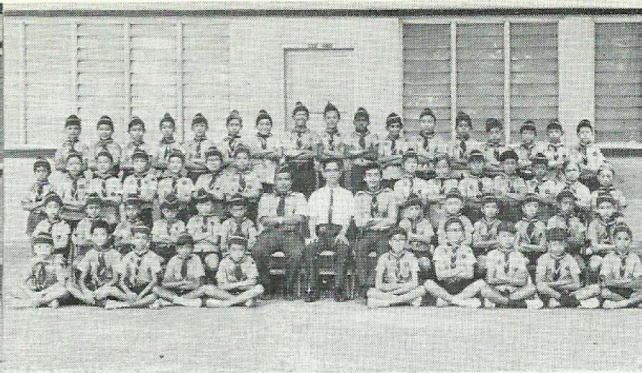

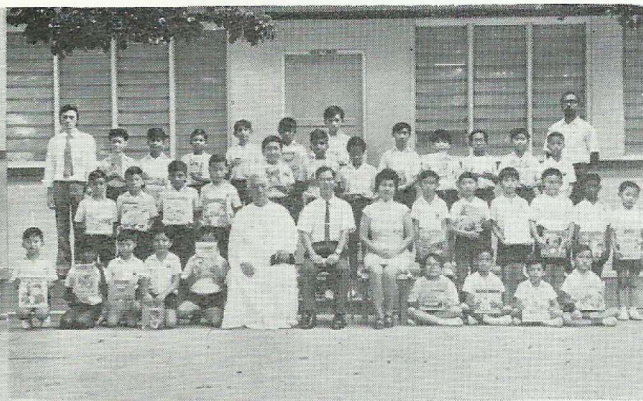

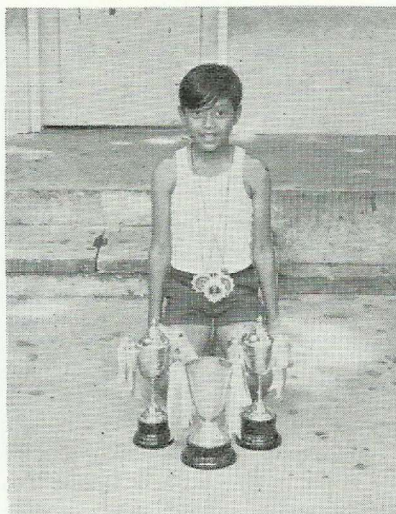

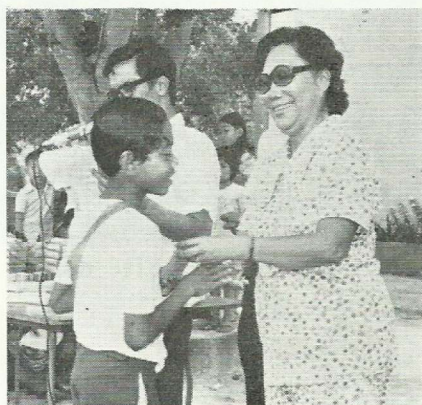
Soccer 6-a-side champions.

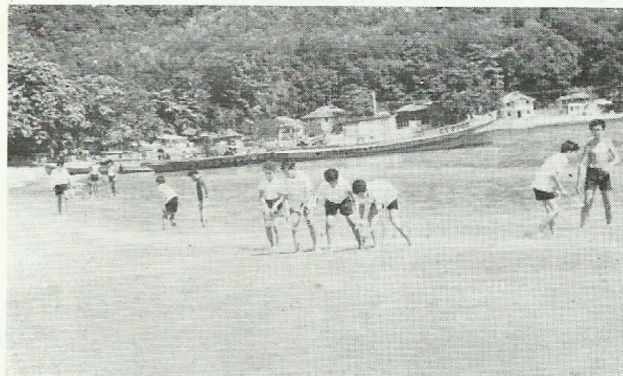

Sixth Form Council

THIS report covers the period August 1972 to July 1973. During this period traditional activities as recommended by the Constitution were carried out.

Last year the Lower Sixes made a trip to St. Xavier's Institution Penang for a series of eleven games. Only nine were played on a competitive basis of which S.M.I. won five thus being the first winner of the Brother Vincent Shield. In addition to that St. Michael's participated in the Sixth Form Games Carnival with St. Anthony's Teluk Anson and retained the Brother Damian Shield. The aim of the games carnivals was to promote better inter Sixth Form relations.

Within the school, last year's Lower Six combined with the Upper Six in another successful series of games to promote inter-class relationship.

Last year the Council organised two food sales to collect funds for trips outstation. At the end of the year a farewell social was organised to conclude the activity of that year. In the first term of 1973, a sixth form badminton tournament was organised. It attracted a lot of entries and was highly successful.

This year with the intake of Lowers, an orientation project was carried out. Part of the orientation was the organising of a talentime. The aim was to create close relationship in quick time with the Lowers. Two weeks following that a Welcoming Social was organised for the Lowers. The highlight of the evening was the crowning of the Freshie King and Queen, Chang Wah Heng and Loh Soo Har respectively, both of LSS1. Part of the evening was reserved for dancing to the music of a hot band. In the second term the present Sixth Formers participated in a series of inter-class games. The games played were soccer, badminton, table tennis, netball, basketball and volleyball. The overall winner of the Yeoh Kean Hin Trophy was USA2 and LSS3 combined. Prizes were also awarded for the winners of the individual games.

On the 14th of July, we played host to St. Anthony's Teluk Anson for our Annual Games Carnival. We won 5 out of the 7 games and retained the Rev. Bro. Damian Shield for the third year running.

Besides the sports activity of the Sixth Form Council, each study group had their respective projects such as Chinese and Bahasa Malaysia lessons, debates, quiz contests, speeches and promotion of Chinese chess games.

Regarding the Sixth Form Souvenir Magazine, it was decided by a two-third majority that it would be better to incorporate it into the School Magazine for various reasons, mainly economic. It was announced that the editor of the School Magazine will in future be a sixth former and there will be a special sixth form section in the School Magazine. It is hoped that with this joint effort, a better School Magazine will be produced.

The Annual General Meeting for the year 1973 was held on the 18th July at which the new office bearers for the term 1973 – 1974 were elected.

At the close of the second term, 1973, the Council invited A.C.S. for a series of friendly games and prepared to play host to St. Xavier's Institution, Penang, for the traditional games carnival. It is hoped that the present Lower Sixth Formers will be enthusiastic enough and determined in playing the said games and retaining the Shield their seniors have earned.

The Council wishes to extend their heartfelt thanks to Rev. Bro. Vincent, Rev. Bro. Casimir and our Advisor Mr. Julianose for their valuable help and guidance.

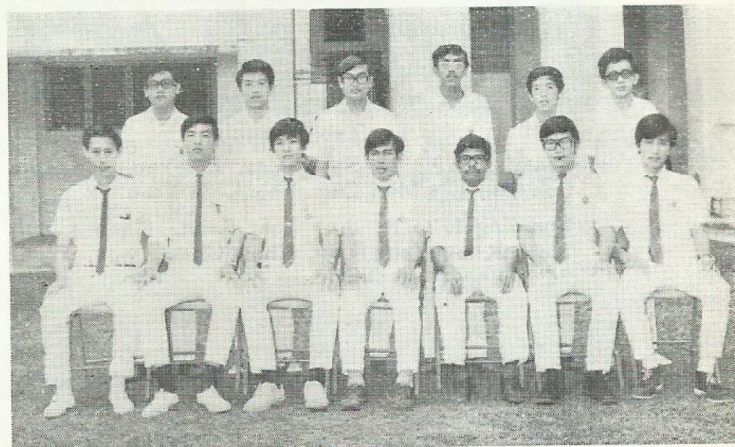

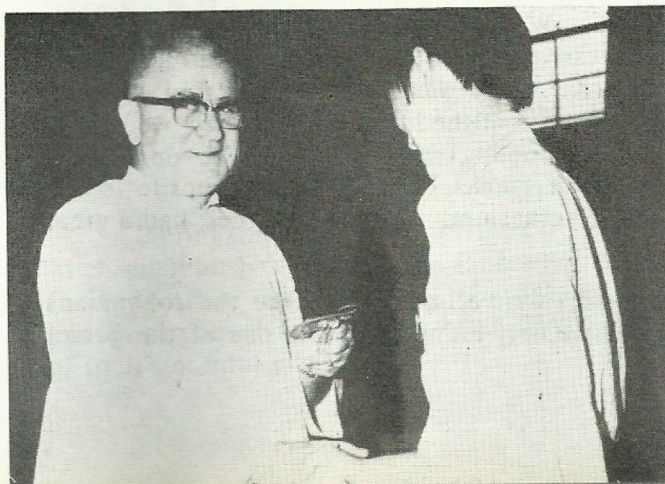
Games Carnival SXI - SMI (1972)

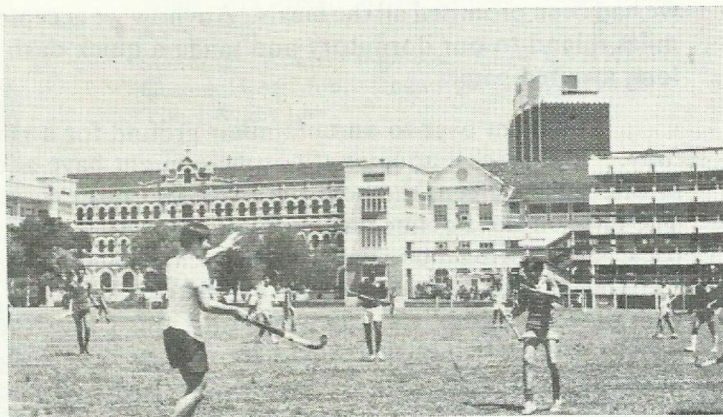

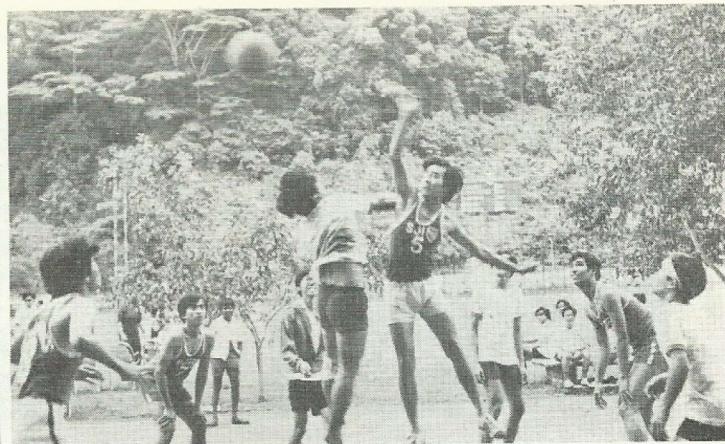
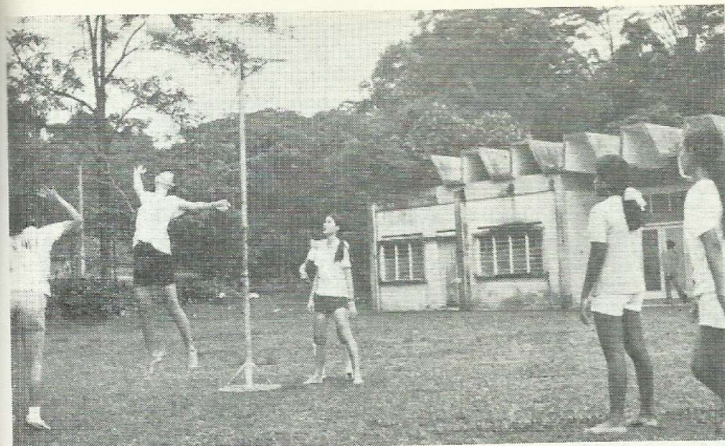
Games Carnival SJI - SMI (1973)

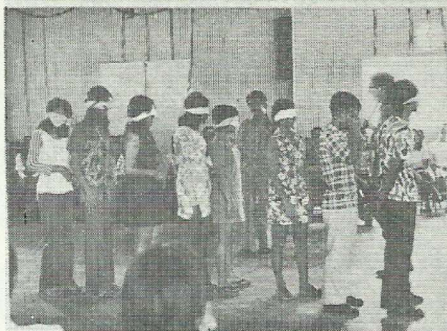
Games Carnival SXL - SMI (1973)

A MEANING FOR ST. MICHAEL'S

I was not a Michaelian for many years, but a few were enough for me to learn what was behind the huge walls of this big building. It appeared at first like a gigantic lion, its huge limbs firmly affixed to the ground, proud and defiant and the only thing that moved against the wind was the fur of its mane.

Being in Form Four then, I could only begin to fit myself in with a whole extravaganza of personalities; pupils and teachers of all shapes, sizes and faces. The routine of daily piles of homework and fortnightly tests carried on as the school terms went by. Exhibitions, sports days, visits and, of course, holidays scattered themselves throughout the year. The glamour of the bands, ordered rows of pupils in uniform, the many exuberant societies indeed made an impression not easy to forget. Academically, I fitted myself in quite all right then, but the question was, what sort of commitment would I make in relation to the other students.

The school itself presented a picture of a pyramid, the strength of the Lower Secondary at the base and the brains at the apex. Diverse degrees of indifference at the base and at points all the way to the top could be seen. Gradually, the climb uphill was slow. Opening one's mind to others took time and a lot of work. Looking around, there were lots of company; friendly smiles were almost

everywhere, but not enough. It was not easy to put in words yet, but I guess I could vaguely grasp a meaning for St. Michael's then — a meaning of my own. To each Michaelian that comes and goes out of these walls, the school will be a meaning for each one.

It is the time I have wasted on St. Michael's that will make it important to me. Likewise, the time wasted taking care of one rose plant out of many will make it important. A cross-section of the school will reveal that the importance of the school to the student will vary with the time they have spent on it. If St. Michael's seems great, it is neither its size nor the numbers of its pupils that make it so; but the great number of things here and there that need to be done for the school.

Several things call out urgently to be done. It is not a swimming pool or a further extension of the school. It would not seem right to have a sprawling building complex of a few acres, may be ten to fifteen stories high in the future, and then to have the thousands of Michaelians entering and leaving the school without having so much as a meaning of their own for the school. Why go so far? A large number leave after Form Three and Form Five without being aware of the help needed around. Some stay on till after Sixth Form to remind themselves that all the help they can give is to themselves. To them, St. Michael's has only a meagre meaning. These are the urgent things that need to be done. The elite of the school left to themselves are contented with their academic success and secure in the reins of power. The rest are left searching for guidance. This may seem sweeping but no one can deny that such a situation exists.

Yet, without this big problem St. Michael's would not seem so great. As Thomas Huxley said of America a hundred years ago, "There is something sublime in the future of America. But do not suppose I am pandering to what is commonly understood by national pride. I cannot say that I am in the slightest degree impressed by your bigness, or by your material resources as such. Size is not grandeur, and territory does not make a nation. The great issue, about which hangs a true sublimity, and the terror of overhanging fate, is what are you going to do with these things?" The same thing applies to our school. This task of giving something for all to do for the school and hence a meaning for the school for everyone challenges the teachers and the pupils. The educational potential of such an undertaking is almost infinite.

It would mean a basic restructuring of the whole school. Privileges and positions of the elite would have to go. The elite must come down to help. There is little they can do for the ground floor from the third floor. The motivations and objectives need to be correctly defined and emphasized to everyone. Most important of all, the teachers and pupils have to be opened up. The only key that can open them is the one that opens you. No one can afford to remain closed as an island in a continent as large as this. Awareness follows next and change will pursue, echoing Thomas Huxley — It is this thing to be done, that needs to be done, that makes St. Michael's great; and not size and numbers. And this job will never end. Each new Michaelian must find a meaning for St. Michael's.

vision shows sometimes, if not, always, feature violence, killing, and murders. Children absorb all these easily and they might try to imitate what their favourite television idol does or does not do. More than this, children may neglect their studies.

At this point, we have to say that parents do make many mistakes either intentionally or accidentally. Parents do err and they would have to acknowledge this fact and more than that, try to understand by devoting more time to their teenage children.
